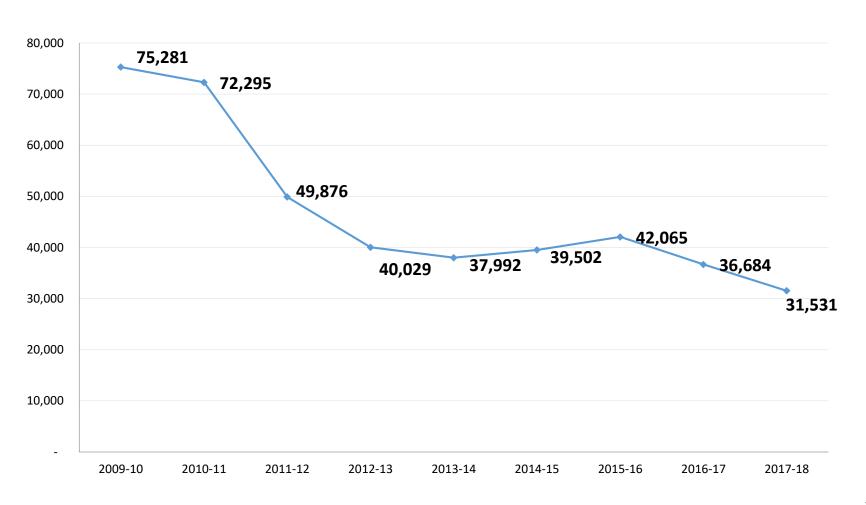


District Adult Education Program Enrollment 2009-10 to 2017-18

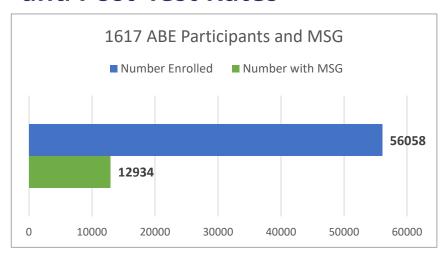

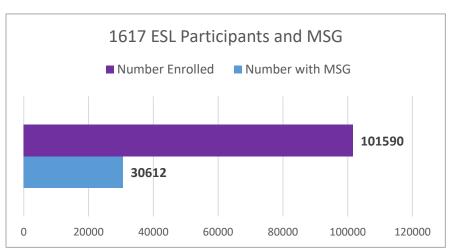

- 3. How will my agency be informed if a fiscal adjustment is needed? Agencies will be notified individually by your FLDOE program manager, if modifications are necessary.

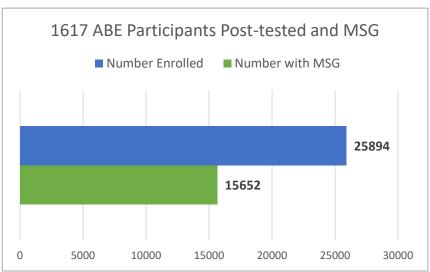


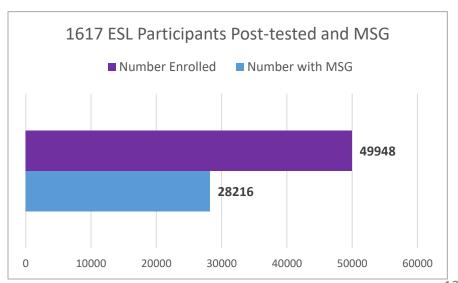

Best Ideas



- September 17 and 18- Meeting of DOE Team Members with District and State College Adult Education Practitioners from the 3 State Advisory Committees (ABE, ESOL, and AHS/GED®-Preparation)
- Guiding our work was an understanding that a growth mindset is the foundation for learning (skills are built and students can learn and grow with effort, challenges, mistakes and feedback) (*Growth Mindset Introduction : What it is, How is Works, and Why it Matters* https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=NugRZGDbPFU)
- "Allow hunches to come together so they become something greater than the sum of their parts" from Steven Johnson's Where Good Things Come From

- Hunches List all of the reasons/issues locally that impact post-test rates. They can be broad or narrow. Try to write down at least 15 reasons/issues. These can be barriers, limitations, external and internal factors.
- Brainstorm at least 20 or more ideas, solutions, suggestions that the group can look at using to develop targeted resources, professional development and technical assistance.







Resources and Policies:

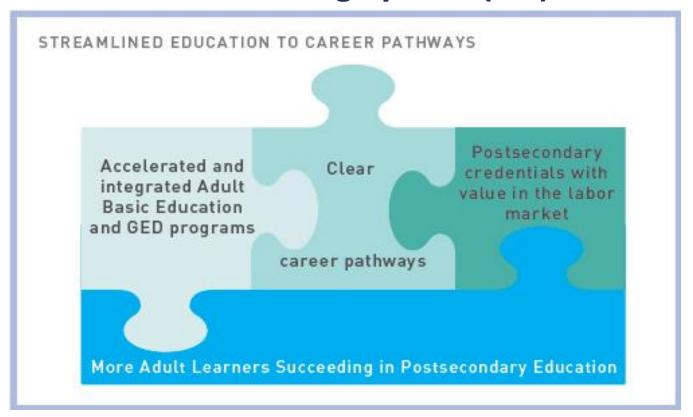
- FDOE will conduct research on instructional best practices that correlate with increased retention that leads to increased PT rates.
 FDOE will also conduct research on enrollment and attendance policies and the impact on PT rates. Based on the research, FDOE will develop TA on best practices to increase PT rates.
- FDOE will create an advisory group to develop a toolkit of orientation activities/processes. Advisory group will review submitted samples establish criteria for inclusion and develop additional items as needed.
- FDOE will develop a series of user guides to provide brief overviews of select PT and assessment information and create a specific communication plan for consistent dissemination of information.

- Integrated education and training elements
 - Earn entry level career certificate
 - Concurrent enrollment in GED®- I Preparation and CTE or ELCATE and CTE
 - Team teaching with GED®- I and CTE teacher or ELCATE and CTE teacher
 - Comprehensive academic and student support



GED®-I Students

- The GED® Integrated course number must only be used for those students who simultaneously enroll in GED® Integrated and a career and technical course simultaneously.
- Must test at or above the 9th grade level in at least two of the content areas (reading, language arts or math) in order to be eligible to enroll in this course. Assessments used to determine educational functioning level must be administered in accordance with Rule 6A-6.014 F.A.C.
- Must be 16 years of age or older, legally withdrawn from K12 system and does not have a State of Florida diploma.



ELCATE Students

The ELCATE course number must only be used for those students who simultaneously enroll in ELCATE and a career and technical course.

- ELCATE students are English language learners who function at EFL 5 and
- Must withdraw from adult ESOL before enrolling in ELCATE
- Students who have attained a high school diploma or postsecondary degree or credential in their home country or elsewhere are permitted to enroll in the ELCATE course if they place into NRS EFL 5 or 6 as measured by a state-approved assessment in accordance with Rule 6A-6.014 F.A.C.



2017-2018 Statewide Enrollment Information

Florida College System:

- 49 enrolled in GED®-I but of those 49 none were found concurrently enrolled in a CTE program during the reporting year.
- 41 enrolled in ELCATE without concurrent enrollment in a CTE program
- < 10 enrolled in ELCATE with concurrent enrollment in a CTE program

School District:

- 11 enrolled in GED®-I with concurrent enrollment in a CTE program
- < 10 enrolled in GED®-I without concurrent enrollment in a CTE program
- 25 enrolled in ELCATE with concurrent enrollment in a CTE program
- 288 enrolled in ELCATE without concurrent enrollment in a CTE program



The state will consider:

Florida's Adult Education Career Pathways Program of Study

Pre-Integrated Education and Training (Pre-IET) – Pre-IET is defined as an adult education instructional service approach (also referred to as a "bridge") wherein adult education course and program instructional standards are taught contextually for a specific occupation or occupational cluster for the purpose of educational and career advancement.

Integrated Education and Training (IET) — IET is defined in Florida's WIOA unified plan as simultaneous enrollment in an eligible adult education program (GED®-I and/or ELCATE) and an eligible State Board of Education adopted postsecondary career and technical education program.



A student will identify a Career Cluster of interest via a career interest assessment (MyCareerShines), then transition from Adult Basic Education and and/or ESOL to GED®-I or ELCATE and/or the career of program of their choice.

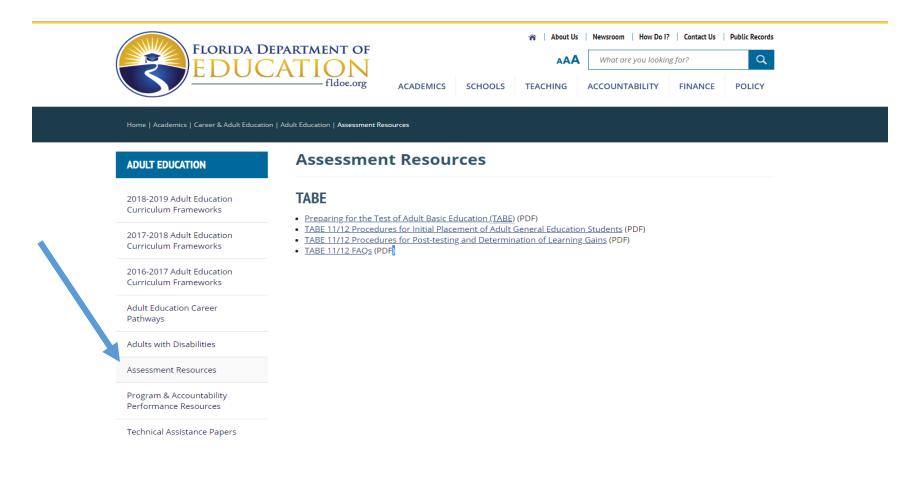
Updates in Adult Education

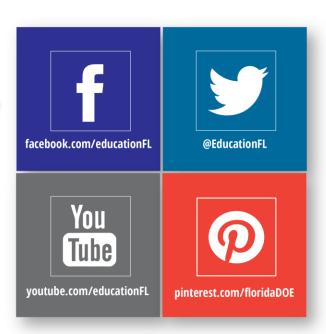
Changing Landscape of Immigration in the U.S.
