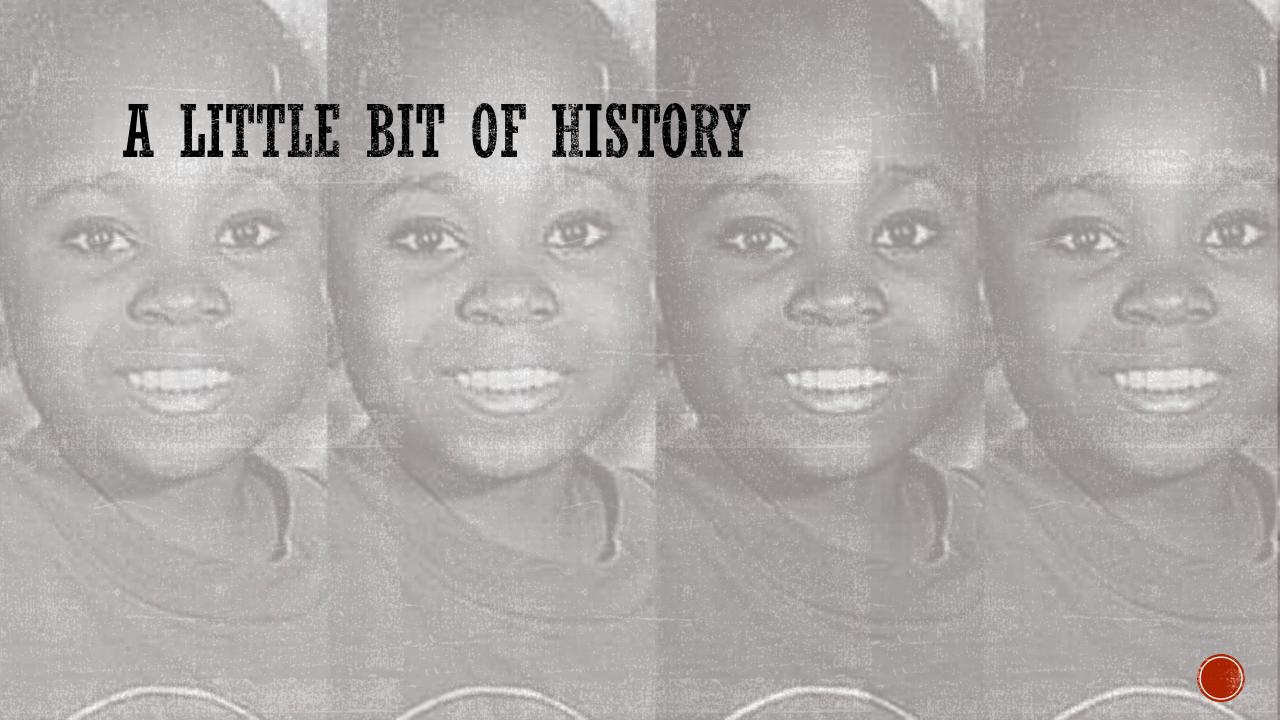

#### CULTURALLY PROFICIENT EDUCATOR

To be a culturally proficient educator means that as an instructor you are creating a class culture that embraces all cultures, ethnicities, genders, sexual orientation, etc. This also includes recognizing and reducing implicit biases and micro-aggressions you may have, and/or students may have about each other.

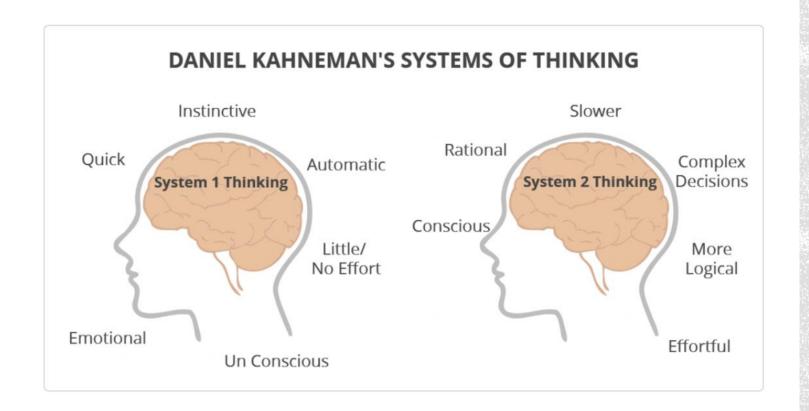


#### IMPLICIT BIAS



- Term began in 1995 by two psychologists: Mahzarin Banaji and Anthony Greenwald,
- Unconscious belief based on stereotypes or perceptions (Staats, 2016).





#### IMPLICIT BIAS

- Implicit bias may not be how we truly feel explicitly (Staats, 2016).
- "These biases often arise as a result of trying to find patterns and navigate the overwhelming stimuli in this very complicated world. Culture, media, and upbringing can also contribute to the development of such biases" (Ruhl, 2020)
- According to psychologist Daniel Kahneman, we have two systems of thinking.

#### IMPLICIT BIAS- STRATEGIES

- Your implicit biases are based on many factors including your own experiences.
- Examine your own implicit biases
- Understanding your own biases is "crucial for educators to help ensure that their explicit intentions to help students learn and reach their full potential are not unintentionally thwarted by implicit biases" (Staats, 2016, p.32).



#### IMPLICIT BIAS - TEST

**Weapons IAT** 

*Weapons* ('Weapons - Harmless Objects' IAT). This IAT requires the ability to record Black faces, and images of weapons or harmless objects.

Age IAT

Age ('Young - Old' IAT). This IAT requires the ability to distinguish old from young often indicates that Americans have automatic preference for young over old.

**Gender-Science IAT** 

*Gender - Science*. This IAT often reveals a relative link between liberal arts and fema science and males.

**Religion IAT** 

**Religion** ('Religions' IAT). This IAT requires some familiarity with religious terms f world religions.

**Gender-Career IAT** 

*Gender - Career*. This IAT often reveals a relative link between family and females a career and males.

**Presidents IAT** 

*Presidents* ('Presidential Popularity' IAT). This IAT requires the ability to recogniz Joseph Biden and one or more previous presidents.

**Race IAT** 

**Race** ('Black - White' IAT). This IAT requires the ability to distinguish faces of Euro African origin. It indicates that most Americans have an automatic preference for which

**Asian IAT** 

Asian American ('Asian - European American' IAT). This IAT requires the ability White and Asian-American faces, and images of places that are either American or Fo

**Disability IAT** 

*Disability* ('Disabled - Abled' IAT). This IAT requires the ability to recognize symbol abled and disabled individuals.

Weight IAT

Weight ('Fat - Thin' IAT). This IAT requires the ability to distinguish faces of people and people who are thin. It often reveals an automatic preference for thin people relat

Skin-tone IAT

*Skin-tone* ('Light Skin - Dark Skin' IAT). This IAT requires the ability to recognize skinned faces. It often reveals an automatic preference for light-skin relative to dark-s

 Several test on the internet that can determine your implicit biases: Most widely used one: Project Implicit Association Test (Harvard)- it's free

#### MICRO-AGGRESSION

Slight statement or remark that usually occur continually because the person conducting the act doesn't recognize it as a problem. These statements are usually "put downs" about an individual's race, ethnicity, gender, or sexual orientation conducted implicitly (Lindsey, R. Robins, K & Terrell, R, 2009).

- "'Wow! You speak well for an African American."
- "Most males don't do well with the writing portion, that's ok!"
- "'Thank you for writing such an articulate e-mail."
- "How did you get this job here?"



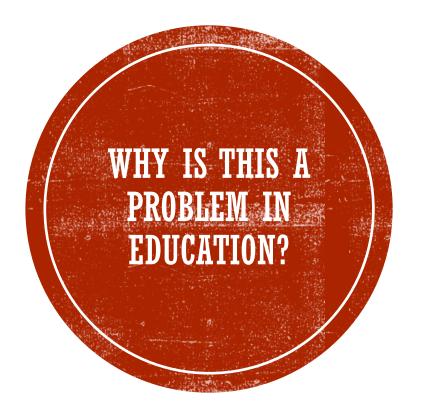
#### EXAMPLES OF MICRO-AGGRESSIONS

- "Don't worry, mathematics isn't a strong academic area for most females."
- "It's ok, people over the age of 50 can't really understand technology."
- •"Ok! I know you attend this university...What sport do you play?"

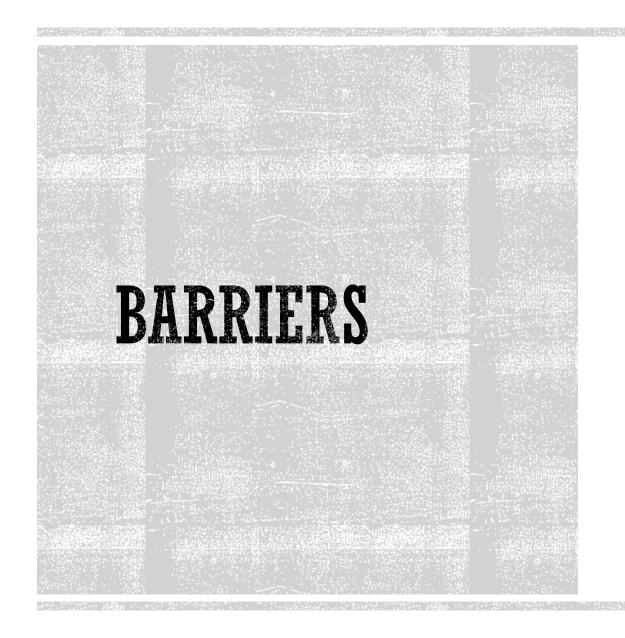
NOT EMBRACING THEIR CULTURE

CREATING A
NEGATIVE
CLIMATE/CULTURE



- The subject makes us uncomfortable, so we become "blind" to this area.
- Our methods/teaching strategies work, so we don't need to change them.
- We don't have time to make this important- our adult learners have their goals.
- Our students are being too sensitive.



Create an environment where all students feel welcomed Create regardless of their age, race, gender, sexual orientation, socioeconomic status, or physical abilities. Notice when students are formulating microaggressions Notice against each other. When creating a syllabus, provide a statement about Provide being culturally inclusive. Stop Stop micro-aggressions from student to student.

#### STRATEGIES

- Recognize your own implicit biases and microaggressions
  - E.g. Not learning or trying to pronounce a student's name correctly
- Whether it is conscious or unconscious, you have a responsibility to your students to be culturally aware create a culturally responsive classroom.
- Create projects that can incorporate student cultures
- Foster relationships with students: Get to know them!
  - Understand the fluid movement in Adult Education, but every student is important.



#### STRATEGIES

- Recognize there are different groups within each ethnic group/race.
  - Example- Hispanic: Mexican, Puerto Rican, Dominican, Cuban, Panamanian, etc.
- Don't assume one person from a race represents the entire culture or their traditions.
- Educate yourself about the cultures of these groups.
- When using supplemental materials, articles, or real-life applications for teaching, try to incorporate some of the cultures within your classroom.



## HOW CAN WE DO THIS WITH ADULT LEARNERS?

- Create an environment that is inclusive of all genders, races, ethnicities, sexual orientation, generations, religions, physical abilities, etc.
- Conference with students
  - What are their goals?
  - Discover and take interest in their cultural background
  - Make note of what is considered important in their culture
  - Take note of important holidays surrounding their culture

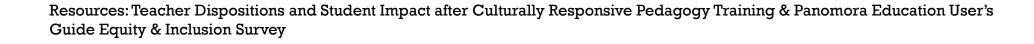
